**Those listed below are related to Henry Adams of Braintree directly or through marriage. About 95% of those listed can be found in the "Henry Adams of Braintree" book. The other 5% were added when my research came across new facts.**

## King Phillips War

**Lieutenant Henry<sup>2</sup>, [Henry Adams of Braintree<sup>1</sup>] b. in England, 1604; m. in Braintree, Nov. 17, 1643, Elizabeth Paine, dau. of Moses Paine, Esq.**

He was Lieutenant of the Medfield military company, which fought against the Indians in 1675-76. He was killed by Indians while standing in his doorway, Feb. 21, 1676, the second year of the war.

**Child of Thomas<sup>4</sup> (*This is the generation number*), (1695 [*This is the birth year*]) [16 [*This is the family number found in the book*]] (John<sup>3</sup>, Ens. Edward<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>) and Abigail (Fisher) Adams; res. Ashford, Conn., and Amherst, Mass.**

Nathan<sup>5</sup>, b. in Ashford, May 16, 1736; m. (1) Hannah Rood, dau. of Solomon and Sarah Rood of Sturbridge, Mass., b. Aug. 3, 1741, d. 20 April, 1767. m. (2) March 14, 1769, Sybil Ward, dau. of Dea. Isaac Ward of Leverett, Mass. She d. 25 Oct., 1839, age 97. He was a soldier in the French and Indian war; took part in the siege of Ft. William Henry, 1757; enlisted as a private from Leverett in the Revolutionary war, Sept. 22, 1777; Capt. Joseph Slarrow, Col. David Wells; discharged Oct. 18, served one month and one day; settled in the east part of Sunderland, now Leverett, Mass., where he and his wife Sybil lived together for 64 years. He d. 1 Jan., 1832, age 97.

## Revolutionary War

**John<sup>7</sup> (1761), Col. Andrew<sup>6</sup>, Dea. John<sup>5</sup>, Edward<sup>4</sup>, John<sup>3</sup>, Ens.**

**Edward<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - A John was Corporal from Milton in Capt. Joseph Vose's company, Col. William Heath's Suffolk regiment, Oct., 1775, and Sergeant in Capt. William Badcock's company, Col. Pierce's regiment; enlisted March 1, 1778; discharged April 3, served at Castle Island. He d. in Worcester, Mass., 23 Sept., 1843, age 82.

**Ebenezer<sup>5</sup> (1746), Ebenezer<sup>4</sup>, Henry<sup>3</sup>, Ens. Edward<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - Was a corporal in Capt. William Watkins' Company, Col. Benjamin Simon's Berkshire regiment; enlisted Dec. 16, 1776; served 2 months 9 days; was at Ticonderoga sick in camp, Feb. 25, 1777; he was allowed a bounty of œ2 in May, 1782, for killing a "wolf."

**Barnabas<sup>5</sup> (1749), Ebenezer<sup>4</sup>, Henry<sup>3</sup>, Ens. Edward<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - He was constable in Becket, March, 1776; was a private in Capt. Peter Porter's company, Col Benjamin Simon's Berkshire regiment, April 26, 1777, to May 20, 25 days; marched to Saratoga, N. Y.

**Capt. Simon<sup>5</sup> (1746) Joseph<sup>4</sup>, Henry<sup>3</sup>, Ens. Edward<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - He was Sergeant from Sandisfield and New Marlboro, Mass., in Capt. Moses Soul's company, Col. John Fellows' regiment, and served 17 days, going to Lexington in April, 1775; he was a Captain in Col. John Collar's regiment, and served under Arnold in the expedition against Quebec.

**Corp. Moses<sup>5</sup> (1748) Joseph<sup>4</sup>, Henry<sup>3</sup>, Ens. Edward<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - He enlisted from Lenox, Mass.; was Corporal in Capt. Soul's company, April 19, 1775; served for 17 days; enlisted May 8, 1775, and served one month and one day; was in Capt. Noah Allen's company, Col. Edw. Wigglesworth's regiment, and was reported dead Aug., 1777.

**Sergt. Zebediah<sup>5</sup> (1753) Joseph<sup>4</sup>, Henry<sup>3</sup>, Ens. Edward<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - He was a private from Sandisfield and New Marlboro, in Capt. Moses Pond's company, Col. John Fellows' Berkshire regiment, April, 1775; served 21 days; enlisted May 8, 1775, and served three months and a day; he enlisted again July 8, 1777, and was discharged Aug. 15. He enlisted as sergeant, Oct. 13, 1781, in Capt. Simon Adams' company, Col. John Collar's regiment, and served 12 days.

**Aaron<sup>5</sup> (1761) Joseph<sup>4</sup>, Henry<sup>3</sup>, Ens. Edward<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - He enlisted at Lenox, Mass., July 18, 1779, in Capt. Samuel Goodrich's company, Col. Miles Powell's regiment; discharged Aug. 22; service, 1 month, 10 days.

**Obed<sup>5</sup> (1745), Thomas<sup>4</sup>, Edward<sup>3</sup>, Jr., Ens. Edward<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - Was a private in Capt. Ebenezer Jenkins' company, Col. Freeman's regiment; enlisted Sept. 6, 1778; discharged Sept. 14; allowed 8 days' service at Falmouth and Dartmouth.

**Micah<sup>6</sup> (1762), Jonathan<sup>5</sup>, Jonathan<sup>4</sup>, John<sup>3</sup>, Ens. Edward<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - Was a private in Capt. John Ellis's company, Col. Seth Bullard's regiment; he enlisted July 29, 1780, served in Rhode Island till Aug. 7; had credit for 12 days. He d. in Medway, Mass., 1 April, 1842, age 80.

**Heman<sup>6</sup> (1761), Thomas<sup>4</sup>, Edward<sup>3</sup>, Jr., Ens. Edward<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - He enlisted as a private from Sandwich, June 9, 1779, for 9 months; is described as 17 years of age, 5 feet and 4 inches high, and light complexion. He enlisted again Aug. 17, 1779, and was discharged May 17, 1780;

**Ansel<sup>6</sup> (1761-2), Edward<sup>5</sup>, Thomas<sup>4</sup>, Edward<sup>3</sup>, Jr., Ens. Edward<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - He was a private in Capt. Matthew Toby's company, Col. Jacob Gerrish; enlisted Aug. 22, 1778; discharged Dec. 14; served 3 months, 27 days at Winter Hill; served again Sept. 6 to 16, 1779, Capt. Simeon Fish, Col. Freeman; enlisted again July, 1780; discharged Jan. 22, 1781; served in war of 1812-14;

**Newton<sup>6</sup> (1764), Thomas<sup>5</sup>, Thomas<sup>4</sup>, Henry<sup>3</sup>, Lieut. Henry<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - A Newton enlisted July 14, 1780, in Capt. Nathan Thayer's Co., Col. Ebenezer Thayer's Suffolk Reg., served 3 mos. and 6 days; was at West Point; discharged O

9, 1780. Also in Capt. Amos Ellis' Co., Col. Dean's 4th Suffolk Reg., March 3, 1715 days, to March 17.

**Capt. Timothy<sup>6</sup> (1757), John<sup>5</sup>, Timothy<sup>4</sup>, Timothy<sup>3</sup>, Lieut. Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** Was a private from Chelmsford, in Capt. John Ford's Co., May, 1775, Col. Bridge Reg., enlisted April 29, 1775, and again, Sept., 1777, Capt. John Ford. Col. Jona. Reed.

**Joseph<sup>6</sup> (1758), Capt. Samuel<sup>5</sup>, Capt. Joseph<sup>4</sup>, Samuel<sup>3</sup>, Lieut. Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - He entered Yale College in 1773, but left to join the army; enlisted May 11, 1775, and was in Gen. Israel Putnam's Reg He served till 1780;

**Davenport<sup>6</sup> (1751), Charles<sup>5</sup>, Thomas<sup>4</sup>, Samuel<sup>3</sup>, Lieut. Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - enlisted in Co. of Capt. Zenas Wheeler, Col. John Ashley, July 8, 1777; discharged July 27, 1777; enlisted again for service in the Highlands in Aug., 1777;

**Pelatiah<sup>6</sup> (1714), Samuel<sup>5</sup>, Pelatiah<sup>4</sup>, Pelatiah<sup>3</sup>, Lieut. Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - He was killed by the enemy Tories and Indians at Cherry Vall, upon Mohaw River above Albany, fall 1778 C.R.1;

**Obediah<sup>5</sup>, Jr. (1721), Obadiah<sup>4</sup>, John<sup>3</sup>, Ens. Edward<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - He was in Capt. Jesse Holbrook's Co., Col. Ephraim Wheelock's Suffolk Reg., from Dec. 8, 1776, Dec. 19, 11 days.

**Jemima<sup>5</sup> (1737), Obadiah<sup>4</sup>, John<sup>3</sup>, Ens. Edward<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - Her husband, Lieut. William Fisk of Upton, Mass., son of Daniel, b. April 14, 1733, d. 9 March, 1848; was Lieut. of the Upton Co. in the Revolution.

**Abner<sup>5</sup> (1733), Thomas<sup>4</sup>, John<sup>3</sup>, Ens. Edward<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - An Abner Adams was private in Capt. Noah Dickinson's Hampshire Co., Col. Elisha Porter's Reg.; enlisted Aug. 18, 1777; marched to New Providence.

**Stephen<sup>5</sup> (1715), Thomas<sup>4</sup>, Timothy<sup>3</sup>, Lieut. Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - The historian of New Ipswich says he was a soldier in the Revolution and furnished three sons for the war.

**Levi<sup>5</sup> (1728), David<sup>4</sup>, Jonathan<sup>3</sup>, Lieut. Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - Levi and his four sons were carpenters by trade; with three of them, viz.: Levi Jr., David, and John, was a soldier in the Revolution. He was at New London, Conn., at the time of the capture of Fort Griswold, Sept. 7, 1781.

**Kesia<sup>5</sup> (1747), Henry<sup>4</sup>, Esq., Henry<sup>3</sup>, Lieut. Henry<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - Her husband, Dr. Josiah Holt, son of Paul and Melatiah (Chandler) Holt, b. Feb. 28, 1754; was a surgeon in the revolution; purchased a cargo of medical supplies on which he realized a large sum;

**Hepzibah<sup>6</sup> (1761), Moses<sup>5</sup>, James<sup>4</sup>, Moses<sup>3</sup>, Lieut. Henry<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - Her husband, Asa Fairbanks, son of Dea. Ebenezer Fairbanks; b. March 4, 1762; was a soldier of the Revolution;

**Sergt. Levi<sup>6</sup>, Jonathan<sup>5</sup>, David<sup>4</sup>, Jonathan<sup>2</sup>, Lieut. Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - He was a carpenter by trade, and a soldier in the Revolution, 1776-8; removed to Pawlet, Vt. 1780; became a Serg. in Capt. Samuel Willard's Co., Col. Ira Allen's Reg., and served 5 days, Oct. 23, 1781. He removed to Milford, Otsego Co., NY, 1799, and thence in 1826 to Ripley, Chautauqua Co., NY He was enrolled as a pensioner, M 11, 1833.

**Capt. David<sup>6</sup> (1756), Jonathan<sup>5</sup>, David<sup>4</sup>, Jonathan<sup>2</sup>, Lieut. Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>**  
 He served as a soldier in Connecticut; removed to Pawlet, Vt., and was with his brother in Capt. Willard's Co., Col. Ira Allen's Reg., in Oct., 1781. He was enrolled as a pensioner in Otsego Co. for services in the Conn. line, July 31, 1818.

**John<sup>6</sup> (1762), Jonathan<sup>5</sup>, David<sup>4</sup>, Jonathan<sup>2</sup>, Lieut. Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - He, and his other brothers, was a carpenter by trade, removed to Vermont, and served as a soldier in the Revolution. He is said to have been on guard at the execution of Major Andre, Oct. 2, 1780. He received a pension from March 4, 1831;

**Jacob<sup>6</sup> (1739), Ephraim<sup>5</sup>, Thomas<sup>4</sup>, Timothy<sup>3</sup>, Lieut. Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - He was a soldier in Capt. Taylor's Co., Dec., 1775, and served in Capt. William Walker's Co., Col. James Read's Reg., from Dec. 7, 1776, to March, 1777.

**Henry<sup>6</sup> (1742), Ephraim<sup>5</sup>, Thomas<sup>4</sup>, Timothy<sup>3</sup>, Lieut. Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - From the history of old Dunstable, says that Jacob and Henry were soldiers of the Revolution from Dunstable.

**Lydia<sup>6</sup> (1749), Ephraim<sup>5</sup>, Thomas<sup>4</sup>, Timothy<sup>3</sup>, Lieut. Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - Her husband, Samuel Holt, son of John and his 2nd wife Deborah (Stevens) Holt; b. in Andover, Mass., May 1, 1749 was a soldier, was at NY in Sept., 1776, in Capt. Abijah Smith's Co., Col. Baldwin's Reg. He d. in Temple, N. H., 5 Dec., 1799. She d. 24 June, 1844.

**Stephen<sup>6</sup>, Jr., (1738), Stephen<sup>5</sup>, Thomas<sup>4</sup>, Timothy<sup>3</sup>, Lieut. Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>**  
 He enlisted, April 23, 1775, from New Ipswich in Capt. Ezra Town's Co., Col. Jar Reed's Reg.; was described as 36 years of age, b. in Dunstable, Mass., 5 feet, 7 inches high, fair complexion, blue eyes;

**Silas<sup>6</sup> (1745), Stephen<sup>5</sup>, Thomas<sup>4</sup>, Timothy<sup>3</sup>, Lieut. Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - He appears to have been a soldier in the Revolution;

**Corp. Levi<sup>6</sup> (1747), Stephen<sup>5</sup>, Thomas<sup>4</sup>, Timothy<sup>3</sup>, Lieut. Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>**  
 He enlisted May 12, 1775, from New Ipswich in Capt. Ezra Town's Co., Col. Jar Reed's Reg.; was described as 5 feet, 9 inches high, fair complexion, blue eyes. He saw his brother Jonas wounded at the battle of Bunker Hill; served through the war about 4 1/2 years.

**Phinehas<sup>6</sup> (1759), Stephen<sup>5</sup>, Thomas<sup>4</sup>, Timothy<sup>3</sup>, Lieut. Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - He was a private in Capt. Town's Co., Col. Reed's Reg., and was killed at the battle of Bunker Hill, June 17, 1775.

**Corp. Jonas<sup>6</sup> (1758), Stephen<sup>5</sup>, Thomas<sup>4</sup>, Timothy<sup>3</sup>, Lieut. Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>**  
 He was a soldier in the Revolution; was wounded at the battle of Bunker Hill, June 17, 1775, and became a waiter to Col. Cilley. He drew a pension under the law of April 27, 1810, from Feb. 6, 1809, to the time of his death.

**Isaac<sup>6</sup> (1761), Thomas<sup>5</sup>, Thomas<sup>4</sup>, Timothy<sup>3</sup>, Lieut. Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - He was a soldier of the Revolution.

**Roswell<sup>6</sup> (1753), Elihu<sup>5</sup>, (1731) [38] (Capt. Joseph<sup>4</sup>, Samuel<sup>3</sup>, Lieut. Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - He was a private in Capt. Obadiah Johnson's Co., Col. Israel Putnam's Reg., May 16 to Dec. 15, 1775.

**David<sup>6</sup> (1754-5), Elihu<sup>5</sup>, (1731) [38] (Capt. Joseph<sup>4</sup>, Samuel<sup>3</sup>, Lieut. Thomas Henry<sup>1</sup> - He was probably a soldier in the same Co. and Reg, as Roswell, May 19 Dec. 16, 1775;**

**Maj. Reuben<sup>6</sup> (1761), Capt. Thomas<sup>5</sup>, Capt. Joseph<sup>4</sup>, Samuel<sup>3</sup>, Lieut. Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup> – Received a pension Dec. 3, 1832, for services in the Revolution;**

**Sybil<sup>6</sup> (1761), Oliver<sup>5</sup>, Benjamin<sup>4</sup>, Capt. Joseph<sup>3</sup>, Capt. Samuel<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup> - Her husband, Moses Hale, son of Moses Hale; was a soldier with Gen Stark in 1777, when 17 years of age.**

**Col. Benjamin<sup>6</sup> (1771), Oliver<sup>5</sup>, Benjamin<sup>4</sup>, Capt. Joseph<sup>3</sup>, Capt. Samuel<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup> - He was a soldier at the time of Shay's rebellion;**

**Benjamin<sup>5</sup> (1744), John<sup>4</sup>, Benjamin<sup>3</sup>, Capt. Samuel<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup> - He was a soldier and officer in the Revolution, gave his sword and a book to his nephew, now (1897) in the possession of Nancy<sup>7</sup>, Mrs. Atwell C. Ellis of Keene N. H.;**

**Dea, Ephraim<sup>5</sup> (1750-1), John<sup>4</sup>, Benjamin<sup>3</sup>, Capt. Samuel<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup> - He was a soldier in the Revolution;**

**Solomon<sup>6</sup> (1758), William<sup>5</sup>, Benjamin<sup>4</sup>, Capt. Joseph<sup>3</sup>, Capt. Samuel<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup> - He was a soldier of the Revolution, a private in Capt. James Varnum's Co., Col. Michael Jackson's Reg., May 15, 1777, to Dec. 31, 1779, and from Jan. 1, 1780, to May 15, 1780.**

**William<sup>6</sup> (1762), William<sup>5</sup>, Benjamin<sup>4</sup>, Capt. Joseph<sup>3</sup>, Capt. Samuel<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup> - He enlisted as a soldier when 18 years of age, serving in Capt. Phineas Parker's Co., from July 2, 1780, to Dec. 6, 5 months and 17 days. He was present at West Point at the execution of Maj. John Andre, Oct. 2, 1780.**

**Capt. Jesse<sup>5</sup> (1743-4), Dea. Jonas<sup>4</sup>, Capt. Joseph<sup>2</sup>, Capt. Samuel<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup> - He was a private from Dracut, in Capt. Stephen Russell's Co., Col. Green's Reg., April 19, 1775; served 4 days.**

**Capt. Abel<sup>5</sup> (1746), Dea. Jonas<sup>4</sup>, Capt. Joseph<sup>2</sup>, Capt. Samuel<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup> - An Abel Adams was picket-guard in Maj. Laomi Baldwin's (afterwards Colonel) Middlesex Reg., May 23, 1775. He was commissioned 2nd Lieutenant in Capt. Benjamin Fletcher's Co. of the 7th Middlesex Reg., July 6, 1780. He served also in R. I. in Capt. Asa Drury's Co., Col. Francis' Reg., Aug 1, to Dec. 1, 1781. Capt. Abel held a commission as captain of a company in the 7th Reg., 3d Div. of the militia of Middlesex Co., dated June 8, 1787.**

**Nathan<sup>5</sup> (1742), Ezekiel<sup>4</sup>, Jonathan<sup>3</sup>, Dea. Jonathan<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup> - He was a private in Capt. Adam Peter's Co., Maj. Seth Bullard's 4th Suffolk Reg., from Aug. 3, 1780, to Aug. 10, serving in R. I. 7 days.**

**Gershom<sup>5</sup> (1745), Ezekiel<sup>4</sup>, Jonathan<sup>3</sup>, Dea. Jonathan<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup> - He was undoubtedly a soldier of the Revolution, a private in Capt. Ephraim Cheney's Co., Col. J. Smith's Reg.; turned out April 19, 1775, and served 11 days; was drafted July 19, 1776, and paid a bounty; enlisted again Dec. 8, 1776, and was discharged Dec. 30th, also served 30 days in R. I., Oct. 1, 1777. He enlisted also. Aug. 3, 1780, in the 4th Suffolk Reg., and was discharged Aug. 7.**

**Capt. John<sup>5</sup> (1744-5), Capt. John<sup>4</sup>, John<sup>3</sup>, Peter<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - Capt. John was a Lieutenant in Capt. Cleveland's Co. at Lexington, April 19, 1775, and was in the battle of Bunker Hill in June. He served in Capt. Cady's Co. of militia in Aug., 1778, and probably became Captain in 1789.

**Samuel<sup>5</sup> (1753), Capt. John<sup>4</sup>, John<sup>3</sup>, Peter<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - He served in the army of the Revolution seven years; was one of the body guard of Gen. Washington.

**Jeremiah<sup>5</sup> (1732-3), Isaac<sup>4</sup>, John<sup>3</sup>, Peter<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - In March, 1780, he served 4 days in Capt. Zebediah Dewey's Co., and in Oct., 1780, he served 8 days in the same company, and was allowed for 16 miles of travel. On the alarm of Oct., 1781, he served 9 days at Castleton, Vt., in the Company of Capt. Abraham Moseley, by order of Lieut. Col. Clark.

**Joseph<sup>5</sup> (1751), Capt. Michael<sup>4</sup>, John<sup>3</sup>, Peter<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - A Joseph of Killingly, enlisted May 11, 1775, in Capt. Joseph Elliott's 8th Co. and served till Sept 28. A Joseph of Killingly bought 94 acres of land in Lanesboro, Mass., April 23, 1777, and he was a soldier in the Revolution, enlisting from Lanesboro.

**Samuel<sup>5</sup> (1744), Joseph<sup>4</sup>, Jr., Joseph<sup>3</sup>, Peter<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - The four brothers, Samuel, Joseph, Benjamin and Abner, were soldiers in the Revolution. They enlisted from the town of Gageboro, now Windsor, Berkshire Co., Mass., in Capt. Wm. Clarke's Co., Col. Benjamin Simonds' Reg., Oct. 13, 1780, and marched from Windsor to Shaftsbury, serving 6 days.

**Joseph<sup>5</sup> & Benjamin<sup>5</sup> (1760), Joseph<sup>4</sup>, Jr., Joseph<sup>3</sup>, Peter<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>** - Benjamin marched from Gageboro, July 9, 1777, by order of Gen.
