Dublin, April 15.

On Sunday last was published from the Altars of all the parish Churches in this City, the following Notice.

Whereas several Tumults & Riots have been of late raised in this City, by the common People, upon Pretence of differing Corn in Garrets and Warehouses, so as to put many Citizens in Apprehension of having their Houses rifled, and goods carry'd away by these Rioters; and whereas it is evident, to all Men of sober Sense, that the only intention and design of our Hon. Magistrates in this Matter, is, to bring good Corn from those Parts where it most abounds, and from Foreign Parts, in order to supply our Deficiency in this dear City, as also to transmit Part thereof unto those Parts of the Kingdom where it is most wanting, to prevent their suffering for lack of Food: The Roman Catholics of this City are therefore strictly commanded on Pain of Excommunication, not to join, either directly or indirectly, in any Riot or Tumult in this City, nor to be aiding, abetting, or assisting in any such Riot or Tumult for the future, as they tender the Welfare of their Souls.

Plymouth, April 18.

A Sloop is put into Catewater, bound from Cagliari in Sardinia, to Canfo in Nova Scotia: she was formerly called the Good Providence, one Robert Halsey, then Master, but by the Hopewell, Richard White, who, with one Jonathan Sinker, and a Dutchman, were all the Hands that brought her in. The Master reported, that in the Straights he sent a Boat on Shore for Water, but that she overboard, and all the people in her were drowned; and that another Hand, a young man, aged about 18, fell from the Mast-Head, and was owned. White said not long here before he set out (as said) for London, as he gave out, to find his Owner, named Coyl, and soon after, Sinker said he had a Letter from White, with an Account that Floyd lived at St. Malo; on which, both he and the Dutchman went away, and the Sloop, which is about 60 Tons, is now abandoned, which occasions serious Conjectures what should be the real Cause of it.

Bristol April 19.

The Press still continues, taking all the Hands out of the cell is that came in the Road. The Captains of the outward bound Ships, to prevent their Men from falling into the Hands of the Press Gang, let the Pilots proceed with their Ships as far as the Holms, while their Men march by Land down the Country, and are fetched off by the Pilot's Boats.

London, April 21.

Yesterday their Majesties went to the Royal Chapel at St. James's; the Earl of Orkney carried the Sword of State, and the Rev. Dr. Rogers, Vicar of St. Giles's Cripplegate, preach'd the Sermon.

London, April 22.

His Majesty has been pleas'd to confer the Honour of Knighthood on Mr. John De Linc, a Native of Holland, an eminent Merchant there, and a great Buyer of Goods at our East India Company's Sales.

Yesterday died, in an advanced Age, John Gunton, Esq; one of the Governors of St. Thomas's and Mr. Guy's Hospitals, and Treasurer to the Society for Propagating the Gospel in Foreign Parts.

The Lord Walpole is recovered of his late Indisposition of the Measles, and goes abroad every Day.

London April 23.

Yesterday in the Evening came on a Hearing before a Committee of the Privy Council at White Hall, in Relation to the Difference between Governor Burnet and the General Court or Assembly of New-England, relating to his Salary. Council Learned in the Law were heard on both sides, and we hear it went in Favour of the Governor and the same is so to be reported to His Majesty.

Paris, April 27.

The Deputies from the Government of Tripoli, who landed at Thoulon the latter End of last Month, are suddenly expected here: They come to make Satisfaction for the Infultes committed on French Ships, and 'tis believed, that in a few Days after their Arrival, they will go to Compiègne, where they will have Audience of his Majesty.

Amsterdam, April 28.

We learn by Letters from Paris, of the 25th Inst: that the said Minister and Mr. Walpole had lately conferred divers times with those of Holland; and that they expected every Moment a Courier from Spain, with the final Resolution of that Court touching the Indulto, and the delivering the Effects of the Galleons; as well as the Negotiations which would decide Peace or War.
