WASHINGTON, May 21—(UP)—Kill NRA, rather than give it but a nine months' extension of life. General Hugh S. Johnson told the radio audience last night.

"It would be far better to kill NRA now," he said. "That would at least remove uncertainty. To leave it in barely tolerated existence—a nightmare 'life-in-death' still threatening through the whole fabric of business, would be deadly. Yet to kill it outright might produce the worst business setback since 1932."
