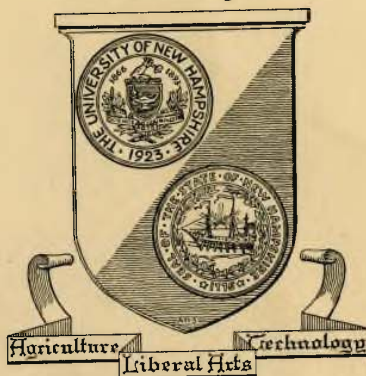


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NEWMAN CLUB



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The Newman Club is a club of Catholic Culture and Fellowship organized in secular colleges and universities of the United States, Canada, Puerto Rico and Hawaii. The purposes of the club are identical with the activities: Religious, Educational and Social, in that order of importance.

The first Newman Club was formed at the University of Pennsylvania in 1893 by five medical students. In 1915 the Federation of Newman Clubs was organized in New York. There are now three hundred clubs belonging to the Newman Club Federation whose headquarters is at the National Catholic Welfare Conference in Washington, D. C.

At the University of New Hampshire a Catholic Club was formed in the scholastic year 1936-37. Among the student organizers were John Galway, Elizabeth Ann Riley and William Redman the last of whom became the first president. Other presidents have been Alfred Trabucco, George McCaffrey, Philip Smith and Thomas Bagley. The local club became a member of the Newman Club Federation in September, 1938.

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
