John Sutton V

Sir John de Sutton V (February 1380 – 28 August 1406)^[1] was the 4th <u>Baron Sutton of Dudley</u>^[2] and heir to <u>Dudley Castle</u>. He was the son of <u>Sir John de Sutton IV</u>, 3rd Baron Sutton, and <u>Joan</u>^[3] (d. 1408).^[2] <u>John married Constance Blount</u> (d. 11 October 1432),^[4] daughter of <u>Sir Walter le Blount</u> of <u>Barton</u> who was killed at the <u>Battle of Shrewsbury</u> in c.1402, whose death was immortalized by <u>Shakespeare</u>.^[5]

John V is a descendant of the first Lord Dudley, Sir John de Sutton II (c. 1310–1359) the first to be summoned to the <u>Parliament of England</u> as Baron Sutton in 1342. [6] From 1397 to 1406, John V held lands derived from the <u>Earls of Powis</u>, upon the death of his great grandmother <u>Isabel de Cherleton</u>. In 1401, during the second year of King <u>Henry IV of England</u>'s reign, John V did homage for the lands, including Castle Dudley. After John V's death, the Blounts had a stake in Dudley lands when his mother-in-law, Sancha de Ayala (d.1418), took custody of his first child John VI, <u>Isabel de Cherleton</u>. Who was age six, as well as being granted John V's valuable estates. Widowed, Constance was eventually sued by <u>Robert Erghom</u> for her dower in the King's chancery by which she defaulted several times on the King's grant of Dudley manor.

John V was succeeded by <u>John Sutton VI</u>, <u>1st Baron Dudley</u>. By Constance, his other children included Thomas Sutton of <u>Dudley</u>, and <u>Elizabeth Sutton</u> of <u>Dudley</u>. He is also said to have had a child, <u>Humphrey Dudley</u>.
