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# **Poppa of Bayeux**

**Poppa of Bayeux** (born circa 880), was the <u>Christian</u> wife or mistress <sup>[2]</sup> (perhaps <u>more danico</u>)<sup>[3]</sup> of the <u>Viking</u> conqueror <u>Rollo</u>. She was the mother of <u>William I Longsword</u>, <u>Gerloc<sup>[4][5]</sup></u> and grandmother of <u>Richard the</u> <u>Fearless</u>, who forged the <u>Duchy of Normandy</u> into a great fief of <u>medieval</u> <u>France</u>.<sup>[6]</sup> <u>Dudo of Saint-Quentin</u>, in his <u>panegyric</u> of the <u>Norman dukes</u>, describes her as the daughter of a "Count Berengar", the dominant prince of that region, who was captured at <u>Bayeux</u> by Rollo in 885 or 889, shortly after the <u>siege of Paris</u>.<sup>[7]</sup> This has led to speculation that she was the daughter of Berengar II of Neustria.<sup>[8][9]</sup>

There are different opinions among medieval genealogy experts about Poppa's family. <u>Christian Settipani</u> says her parents were Guy de Senlis and Cunegundis, the daughter of <u>Pepin</u>, <u>Count of Vermandois</u>, and sister of <u>Herbert I, Count of Vermandois</u>.<sup>[10]</sup> <u>Katherine Keats-Rohan</u> states she was the daughter of Berengar II of Neustria by Adelind, whose father was <u>Henry</u>, <u>Margrave of the Franks</u>, or Adela of Vermandois.<sup>[11]</sup> Despite the uncertainty of her parentage, she undoubtedly was a member of the <u>Frankish</u> aristocracy.<sup>[12]</sup> A statue of Poppa stands at the Place de Gaulle in Bayeux.<sup>[13]</sup>
